Children's Books

A Family that Fights by Sharon Chesler Bernstein (J362.8292 BER)

Henry's parents fight often and his father sometimes hits his mother, causing Henry to feel frightened and ashamed. To be used by parents or professionals to help talk with children about how it feels to live with family violence. Includes a list of things children can do in situations of family violence.

A Place for Starr by Howard Schor & Mary Kilpatrick (362.8292 SCH)

Starr and her little brother Tyler hide under the bed when her father gets upset and becomes violent--until their mother takes them to a shelter.

A Terrible Thing Happened by Margaret M. Holmes, Sasha J. Mudlaff & Cary Pillo (illustrator) (362.8292 HOL)

After Sherman sees something terrible happen, he becomes anxious and then angry, but when a counselor helps him talk about these emotions he feels better.

Squabbles by Steven Cosgrove & Robin James (illustrator) (362.8292 COS)

The Squabbles, a raccoon family newly arrived in the Forest of Glade, shock the community when it is discovered that the father is beating his wife and son.

What Jamie Saw by Carolyn Coman (FICTION COMAN, C.)

Having fled to a family friend's hillside trailer after his mother's boyfriend tried to throw his baby sister against a wall, nine-year-old Jamie finds himself living an existence full of uncertainty and fear.

For Adults - About Children & Domestic Violence

Childhood Experiences of Domestic Violence by Caroline McGee (362.767 MCG)

Examines children's experiences of a range of service provision in response to domestic violence, drawing on first-hand accounts of children and their mothers regarding their experiences in both domestic violence and support services.

Children Who See Too Much by Betsy McAlister Groves

Shows how children understand, respond to, and are affected by violence, especially domestic violence.

Children's Perspectives on Domestic Violence by Audrey Mullender, et al.

Drawing on research designed to hear the voices of children and young people, this important book examines children's experiences and perspectives on living with domestic violence.

Coping with Family Violence by Morton Kurland (362.82 KUR)

Easy to understand, true stories in various settings and situations depict child abuse and other kinds of violence between family members.

Domestic Crimes, Family Violence and Child Abuse: A Study of Contemporary American Society by Barri Flowers (362.8292 FLO)

The author examines both the roots and the consequences of domestic violence, and proposes possible solutions.

Good Answers to Tough Questions: About Traumatic Experiences by Joy Berry (155.418 BER)

Describes the nature of traumatic experiences, tells how to handle different types of trauma, and explains how to learn from them and grow

Identifying and Responding to Domestic Violence: Consensus Recommendations for Child and Adolescent Health by the Family Violence Prevention Fund

Contains an overview on IPV and health effects of IPV on adults, teens and children, Dilemmas faced by providers, consensus recommendation and preparing your child health practice.

The Batterer as Parent by Lundy Bancroft & Jay G. Silverman (362.8292 BAN)

Gives an understanding of the atmosphere that battering men create for the children who live with them. Shows how partner abuse affects each relationship in a family and explains how children's recovery is linked to the healing and empowerment of their mothers.

When Dad Hurts Mom by Lundy Bancroft (362.82923 BAN)

Guide to show readers how to help their children heal the wounds of witnessing abuse.

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
